Third Annual Awards Night Celebrates Tradition and Seniors

The energy of the recent Final Four games with the mascots, the bands, the banners, and the rabid fan bases who travel long distances at great expense to support their teams is built upon a single common foundation: tradition. And this pride in tradition, in being part of something meaningful and enduring, is also what brought together current and former players for the third annual awards banquet on March 27. Sponsored by the MBAC, the event honored the achievements of the current team in categories ranging from performance benchmarks to scholastic excellence to work ethic and character.

Emcee and MBAC President Andy Garsteck '74 opened the evening with The Nose to the Grindstone/Gym Rat Award and this year there was a three-way tie. Alumnus Doug Wilson '16 presented the first award to Mike Bigley.

"The honor means a lot to me ," Mike explained," because it shows that my teammates think highly of me in regard to the time and dedication I put into improving my game."

Alumnus Gene Brisbane '74 EDUC/ '79 MEd presented to Matt Marinchak.

"I think the award is one that everyone on the team should want. It shows that you really love the game and will work out every day for countless hours trying to get better," said Matt echoing Mike's sentiments about winning the award.

The third award was presented by alumnus Jim Murphy '76 to three-time winner Micah Jones '24. In making the presentation, Jim emphasized Micah's consistency and mental toughness, evidenced by his receiving an award three years in succession.

"Winning these awards has actually allowed me to understand that all the work I have put in for these last years and improving over time was the most significant

accomplishment overall," Micah said, "The ups and downs of the journey, shooting on the gun for hours, breaking my hand senior year, having great games, or bad...receiving these awards are reminders that I persevered through everything and have been prepared for whatever comes next. God's grace is evident and hopefully, He allowed me to leave a lasting impact on the younger guys."

Performance awards for Most Improved Player, Best Offensive Player, and Best Defensive Player were next in line, presented by alumni Dom Domasky '00, Joe Mancini '18, and Cam Seigfried '21 respectively.

THIRD ANNUAL AWARDS NIGHT CELEBRATES TRADITION CONTINUED

In presenting the Most Improved Player award to Josh Mentzer, Dom credited Josh with helping the team fight through adversity and for being an inspiration to his teammates. Joe followed up with the Defensive Player of the



Year Award, which he presented to Jackson Byer, Joe observed that Jackson used his super power to be in the right place at the right time, leading the team with 56 steals, and leading the AMCC in steals per game with 2.5 steals a game, and finishing 21stin steals in all of D-3 country wide. Cam recognized Trent Rozich as Offensive Player of the Year. In six offensive categories on this team, Trent finished first or second, while leading the team in field goal percentage, rebounds, and assists. Trent also was second in points scored, in points per game, and in free throw percentage. In these same six categories, conference-wise, Trent finished in the top ten.

FORMER PLAYER REFLECTS ON THREE-PEAT MBAC AWARDEES



Micah Jones '24 and Mikey Gaffney '24 capped off their senior years as the first players to be selected as MBAC award recipients for three consecutive seasons. They are the first to accomplish this feat. As a fellow MBAC award recipient, I understand just how impressive it is to win three years in a row. It is truly something to admire.

Micah was the winner of the Most Improved Player ('21-'22) and the Gym Rat ('22-'23, '23-'24) awards. From being the most improved player to being labeled a gym rat, it goes to show how much time Micah spent in the gym. He was always striving to

WILL BUTLER '24 GOES FROM PLAYER TO COACH

Will Butler '24 came to Pitt-Greensburg with high hopes, but his career was plagued with injuries and health problems that hindered his success on the court. But, his teammates and coaches will tell you he was an important ingredient to any success. His leadership ability made him the go-to-guy for other players. He was able to translate his knowledge of the game in a way that helped his teammates.

He has many memories of his time on the court. He recalls his first year under Coach Jackson when he was healthy and played in just about every game. This past year gave him some memories too including his first game back after an injury against Hilbert in which the few very important minutes he contributed helped secure a victory. He also remembers his teammates' successes such as Trent Rozich scoring 39 points and getting 20 rebounds against Carlow, and Josh Mentzer's efforts in the win over Pitt-Bradford during the AMCC playoff game.

Will learned things on campus that he will carry with him into the real world. The first lesson is to never give up. Secondly, he doesn't need to go through tough times alone when there are good friends and trusted people on which to rely. He is also grateful for Dr. Anne M. Czerwinski, his communication professor, who always pushed him to be the best version of himself.

After graduation, he will return to Cleveland to coach basketball at Cornerstone Christian Academy and teach health and physical education at Saint Robert and William Middle School. He'll be doing what he loves best — coaching young people.

He is very proud to be the first person in his family to graduate from college and hopes his example will motivate, inspire, and encourage his nieces and nephews to do the same and dream big.

WHERE ARE THEY NOW: GENE BRISBANE '74 EDUC, '79 MED AND ERIC KOCIAN '00

Gene '74 EDUC, '79 MEd was a member of the early '70s basketball team. From the time he graduated with his master's in education, Gene has been a constant presence in the academic and sports venues in Westmoreland County.

For 35 years, he was a teacher in the Hempfield Area School District and was recognized four times in Who's Who Among America's Teachers. He also has served as adjunct professor at Seton Hill University. He found his way into coaching as a 9th grade girls' basketball coach in 1974. He has served as either an assistant or varsity head coach for both boys' and girls' track and basketball at Hempield, Jeannette, Greensburg Salem, and Derry. Gene is presently Head Varsity Girls' Basketball Coach and Assistant Varsity Track Coach at Derry Area High School. Gene's experience at the collegiate level includes being the Westmoreland County Community College head womens' basketball exceeds and Schop Hill University Areak Track Coach in charge of mon's and women's ium

One of Eric Kocian's former Pitt-Greensburg students and MBAC member Jaylen Williams '23 describes him as an excellent example of the athlete, scholar, and professional that campus produces. From his time as a student to life after graduation, Eric has excelled and inspired.

Eric attended Pitt-Greensburg from '95-'00 and graduated with a BS in

psychology, a BA in administration of justice, and a minor in Spanish. During his time on campus Eric played basketball for Coach Matt Furjanic and served as a co-captain of the first team to win an AMCC championship ('98-'99). Having served with the Marines, he brought a hard work attitude with a no-nonsense approach to the team.

After graduation, he earned his master's degree and PhD in criminology. After completing those degrees, Eric accepted an assignment as a special agent with the FBI. However, he wanted to be near home and returned to the Greensburg area where he has been happily employed at Saint Vincent College for over a decade. He recently was awarded tenure and named his department's chairperson. He also served as an adjunct professor for both Pitt-Greensburg and IUP.

Family has always been important to Eric. His parents Jim and Sandi live in Derry. His brother Zach '08 was inducted into the Pitt-Greensburg Athletics Hall of Fame Class of 2024. Another brother Jason and his wife Lacey moved back from Oregon with their two sons. He has shared his love of the game with his nephews Nico and Luca teaching them how to play. His family extends to his former teammates. Dom Domasky '00 has given him the honor of being the godfather to his two children.

Myron C. Jones II '98 Leads Alumni at Graduation

As the 2023 Pitt-Greensburg Alumni Association (PGAA) Alumnus of Distinction, Myron C. Jones II also had the distinct honor to be the alumni marshal at Commencement on April 27. He not only led alumni and members of the President's Advisory Board in the procession at both ceremonies, but he distributed diploma covers during the 1 p.m. ceremony. He follows in the footstep's of Harry Bowser, who was the alumni marshal in 2017.



THIRD CLASS INDUCTED INTO PITT-GREENSBURG ATHLETICS HALL OF FAME

On February 9, Athletic Director Jeromy Yetter welcomed the new inductees to the third class of the Pitt-Greensburg Athletics Hall of Fame. Jeromy was followed by Pitt-Greensburg President Dr. Robert Gregerson who welcomed the inductees and their guests to the event. After dinner, the inductees were presented with their awards.

Former Pitt-Greensburg President Dr. Frank Cassell spoke first. He was president when the campus' Athletics Department transitioned into the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), and he worked with fellow Hall of Famers Dan Swalga and Rick Fogle to achieve the department's NCAA status. Dr. Cassell spoke of how important athletics and academics were to the growth of Pitt-Greensburg, and reminisced about how he and his wife enjoyed being fans of the early four-year teams.

Then, Zach Kocian '08, brother of MBAC member Eric Kocian '00, was inducted for his cross country achievements. Zach was named to the AMCC All-Conference Team all four years he ran for Pitt-Greensburg. The record time he set in the 8k held until this past fall. He finished 8th twice in the AMCC Championship meet, which is still the best finish in program history. He had the audience laughing when he noted that since the University was honoring him, he felt it was time to finally return his uniform as handed it to his former coach.

The soccer program added another inductee when Adam DiCarlo '06 accepted his award. His resume included 63 goals scored in three years ('02-'05). He still leads that category in the records and maintains a 20-goal lead over the next closest player in

the record book. He was named 2002 AMCC Newcomer and Player of the Year. He was also named first team All-AMCC ('02-'04) and AMCC 25th Anniversary Team. He emotionally recalled his college career and shared his gratitude for the opportunity to play at Pitt-Greensburg. Like Zach, he brought a memento with him. Setting them on the podium, he shared a pair of cleats he wore when he set his records.

Finally, the 2002-2003 Women's Basketball Team was inducted. Coached by Carol Gelet, Andy Jeter, and Mark Katarski, they won the program's first AMCC title with a 10-2 season in the conference and finished the season at 23-7 overall. That team defeated Mount Saint Mary in the first round of the D3 NCAA Tournament 62-54. That win has stood as the only win by an AMCC team in the NCAA Tournament. Coach Gelet spoke first and with a great deal of pride she felt for this team. She was followed by players Annie Sral '05 and Erin Arnold '04. Annie entertained the crowd with a few of the team's off-court antics, but she also spoke of the camaraderie that bonded the players. Then, Erin spoke about how any member of the team could rise to the occasion and be a hero. Joining Erin and Annie at the event were, Jen Smith '06, Amy Bandszuch '06, Torey Auld '04, Jess Phillipi '21, Jess Porter '20, Lindsay Rodgers '05, Tish Hines '06, and Amy Ploskunak '05.
