NEW COURSES OFFERED IN FALL 2025 (TERM 2261)

ANTH 1761 - PATIENTS AND HEALERS: MEDICAL ANTHROPOLOGY 1 3

3 cr

This course surveys the field of medical anthropology and its history within the discipline of anthropology as a whole, from the perspective of social-cultural theory. Topics dealt with include ethnomedicine, ethnographic cases, cross-cultural studies of healing practices and connections between medicine and religion. Reference is also made to applied research in contemporary situations.

MGMT 1842 - PROCUREMENT AND PURHCASING MANAGEMENT

3 cr.

In the global environment purchasing and procurement functions are about much more than bringing goods and services into an organization. They are strategic activities which impact all areas of the firm, including financial planning, forecasting, sales, quality management, product design, manufacturing planning and control, inventory management, information system design, e-commerce activities. Procurement and Purchasing Management course provides students with a comprehensive understanding of the process of acquiring goods and services for a business, including sourcing suppliers, negotiating contracts, managing purchase orders, evaluating supplier performance, and ensuring compliance with company policies, all while optimizing cost and quality within the company's supply chain. It equips students with the skills necessary to strategically source and purchase goods and services effectively for an organization.

NUR 0005 - HONORS FRESHMAN SEMINAR

1 cr.

Using a flexible format, this course is designed to provide beginning nursing students with an overview of the David C. Frederick Honors College and the honors track within the school of nursing. The purpose of this course is to facilitate the students' exposure to the David C. Frederick Honors College environment, and to acquaint them with the opportunities and resources that are available to promote success in the honors track in the school of nursing.

PHIL 0330 - POLITICAL PHILOSOPHY

3 cr.

This introductory level undergraduate course studies several important views on the nature and justification of government, such as those of Plato, Hobbes, and Marx.

THEA 1733 – SPECIAL TOPICS: SOCIAL MOVEMENTS IN THEATRE

3 cr.

Theater has long been used as a tool for social activism to raise awareness, challenge perceptions, and inspire change. Theater can be a way to make abstract issues more relatable and encourage critical thinking. In this class we will align social movements in our country with corresponding movements in theatre and the arts. By engaging with and appreciating the creative arts, we can connect with these movements on a human level and think about our history and society in unique ways.
